## BIBLE READING FOR 2023

WEEK #40 JEREMIAH 41 - LAMENTATIONS 10-01-23

Monday - Jeremiah 41-46 Wednesday - Jeremiah 50-51 Friday - Lamentations 3-5

Tuesday - Jeremiah 47-49 Thursday - Jeremiah 52 - Lamentations 2

Lamentations is recognized by most scholars to be Jeremiah's expression of deep grief over the destruction of Jerusalem and the temple, of which he was an eye witness. He probably wrote this poetic dirge for his nation shortly after it fell in 586 B.C.. Jeremiah acknowledges that what happened to Judah was divine judgment for their sins and prays for forgiveness and mercy from the Lord. He knows that their only hope for the future rests in a right relationship with their God. Even though Jeremiah himself was taken away to Egypt against his will this book was probably intended primarily for the exiles in Babylon.
